

# 2026 Agricultural Literacy Project- BONUS ACTIVITY

## Oregon Berry Passport, Grades 2-3

Keep the berry magic going with this follow-up activity to the 2026 Literacy Project, *I Love Strawberries!* In this bonus activity, students will create a berry passport, showcasing all the places their berry knowledge has taken them. **NOTE:** Students will need to use the internet.

**Grade Level:** 2-3

**Time:** 60 minutes



**Materials:**

- Berry Passport worksheet, one per student **\*\*make copies ahead of time\*\***
- Scissors
- Coloring utensils
- Computer or laptop

**Introduction**

1. Before introducing the activity to the students, create an example passport that is colored, cut, and folded. For a demonstration video on how to cut and fold, use the QR code on the left-hand side.
2. Tell the students they are going to learn about six popular and important berries grown in Oregon. Present the blank passport and say, "This is the Oregon Berry Passport that will show us how much we have learned about berries! Before we start to explore each berry, we first have to fold and cut the passport." Show the class the finished passport you prepared for the demonstration.
3. Pass out the passport activity page and demonstrate how to cut and fold the passport. Feel free to use the video provided by OAITC or walk through each step with them using your own incomplete passport.
4. Once the passports are made, follow the QR code under Berry Information to find the information needed to complete the passport. Students should use this page to complete the missing information (name, color, taste, harvest, and fact).

**Passport Assembly Directions**

1. With the passport activity sheet in front of you, fold it in half hamburger-style. Unfold the paper, then fold again in half hotdog-style. It does not matter if the words face in or out.
2. Unfold the sheet and turn it over so that the blank side is up. There will be a crease through the middle of the paper both ways. Now, take the right side of the paper and fold it to meet the center crease, cutting the hamburger in half. Do the same with the left side. If done correctly, the two sides should meet in the middle, at the crease.
3. Unfold the paper again. At this point, the paper should have 8 small rectangles outlined by creases.
4. Fold the paper hamburger-style one more time, so that the images are on the outside, and the area with the Oregon Agriculture in the Classroom logo is touching the spine of the fold.
5. With scissors, cut halfway across the paper, starting at the halfway point of the spine. If done correctly, you should cut just the bottom edge of the rectangle with the OAITC logo. Do not cut all the way across the page. For assistance, refer to the Assembly Directions video by using the QR code.
6. Unfold the paper one last time. With the images facing up, there should be a cut that runs through the middle of the paper, touching Cranberry, OAITC logo, Marionberry, and Blueberry.
7. Now, fold the paper hotdog style with the images facing out. Grab the ends of the paper and push them together, so the space where the cut is opens up into a diamond and the spine makes the shape of a cross. Find the corners of the cross that are made up of the title (Berry Passport) and back (OAITC logo) pages of the passport and fold from that corner, pushing and rotating the folded section so the title page is on the front and the OAITC logo page is on the back. You now have a completed passport!
